

CHILD CARE IS OUT OF REACH FOR LOW-INCOME WORKING FAMILIES

Without subsidy, a low income family spends about 1/3 of their annual income on child care for one infant.






CHILD CARE SUBSIDY SHORTAGES EXIST IN EVERY COUNTY IN NORTH CAROLINA

All 100 counties serve less than one third of eligible infants and toddlers. Half of all counties have at least 50 infants and toddlers on the waiting list.

There is extensive unmet need throughout the state.



- 25 counties serve less than 33%
- 64 counties serve less than 20%
- 11 counties serve less than 10%
