

## Legislative Session Process

- Budget Cycle
  - House passed its budget
  - Now goes to the Senate
  - Senate likely to pass its budget soon
  - Then goes to Conference Committee
  - When passed off to the Governor for signing or veto
- Timing
  - Could be completed by end of June.





## Legislative Session Process

#### Bill Action

- Bills had to make "crossover" deadline of May 9<sup>th</sup> to still be eligible
- Exceptions
- Bills that passed House or Senate go on to the other Chamber for consideration next
- Once passed by both Chambers
  - If Different will go to Conference Committee to work out differences
  - If Same go to the Governor for signing
- Timing by the end of the legislative session



## House Budget Summary

#### Smart Start

- Includes \$7M over two years non-recurring funding
- Focus on child care related activities, family support, and child health; NOT subsidies

#### NC Pre-K

- Maintains \$9M in expansion funding passed last session
- Replaces state funding with federal TANF funds
- Provides rate expansion 2% in FY 19/20 and 6% in FY 20/21
- Rates dedicated to salaries for teachers in private child care programs

#### Child Care Subsides

- Adds \$7M in child care subsidies, to serve approximately 1,100 children
- Decreases parent co-pay from 10% to 9%



### Goal on the Senate Side

- House budget goes to the Senate now
- Goals
  - Increase Child Care Subsidy Assistance to \$31 million
  - Change non-recurring funding to recurring
  - Replace federal funding for NC Pre-K with state or lottery funds

### Early Childhood Workforce Bill – H882/S634

#### H882/S634 does 3 simple things:

- Puts into law basic early education standards for lead early childhood teachers that are already in place by practice or through the state's QRIS star-rate license system.
- Creates a teacher compensation program for qualified lead teachers through the existing child care subsidy program.
- Creates a model Infant Toddler Program based on the NC Pre-K program to address the acute shortage of qualify infant toddler programs.

## Current Legislative Status

- H882 passed the House 111-0, moved to the Senate.
- House amendment deleted provision requiring participation of religious sponsored programs.
- House budget had no appropriation.
- Senate did not pass S634 will likely take up H882 as amended.
- Senate may consider amendments
  - Add back in religious exemptions?
  - Take out core competencies?
  - Make other changes
  - Add appropriation either in the bill or through the budget process



### **Education Standards**

- Focus only on lead teachers in child care programs and Family Child Care Homes.
- Effective January 1, 2020 -
  - Mostly changes the NC Early Childhood Credential requirement. Required to have NC Early Childhood Credential as a pre-service requirement.
  - Lead teachers who only have the Credential also required to obtain Infant Toddler or Preschool Certificates within 18 months by July 2021.
  - Family child care homes will have to have the NC Early Childhood Credential <u>before</u> they apply for a new license and will have 18 months to obtain the Infant Toddler or Preschool Certificate by July 2021.

Note: Does not apply to Lead teachers who already have Early Childhood Diploma or Associate Degree or higher. These qualifications exceed the new standards.



## Professional Core Competencies

#### Purpose:

- Creates professional standards that are explicitly stated and not just embedded in coursework.
- Gives teachers opportunity to demonstrate they have the equivalent skills.

#### What?

- Requires DCDEE to develop professional core competencies based on the Infant Toddler and Preschool Certificates and a process for teachers to demonstrate they have the required skills.
- Additional Sources: NAEYC and National Academies of Science report, "Transforming the Workforce for Children from Birth through Age 8"

Note: Required in H882. Not included in S634.



### Compensation

#### New strategy – goes into effect July 1, 2020

- A new incentive program through the child care subsidy system to support teachers with higher education receiving additional compensation.
- Differentiated based on the level of degree attained.
- Eligibility: child care programs must use a salary scale and only employ lead teachers who have obtained an associate degree in child developed or related field.
- Adds to existing compensation strategies already in place
  - Child Care WAGE\$® Program
  - Infant-Toddler Educator AWARD\$® Program



## Model Infant Toddler Program

- Requires DCDEE to develop a feasibility and cost study to create a program modeled after the North Carolina Pre-Kindergarten (NC Pre-K) program for classrooms for children birth through 3 years of age.
- Components are indicated in the bill (see FAQ).
- DCDEE is required to report to the legislature on this program by April 1, 2020.
- No funds are appropriate for this component. Action to create and fund could be done during the 2020 legislative session.
